**Course Contents:** Introduces the concepts of mathematical proofs using the construction of the real numbers from set theory. Topics include basic logic and set theory, equivalence relations and functions, Peano's axioms, construction of the integers, the rational numbers and axiomatic treatment of the real numbers.

The main intention of this course is to provide a bridge between the more computationally oriented Calculus courses and the more abstract upper division Mathematics courses like MATH 3001 Analysis 1 and MATH 2135 Linear Algebra. It serves as a prerequisite for these courses and can be taken as an alternative to MATH 2001.

**Homework and Exams:** Homework assignments will be given on Canvas on a bi-weekly basis. Homework is due at the beginning of class on the due date stated on Canvas. It is the student's responsibility to get these assignments in the event of an absence from class. Homework will be graded. Late turn-ins will not be accepted. Show all your work.

## CLASSROOM BEHAVIOR

## REQUIREMENTS FOR INFECTIOUS DISEASES
