Technology: You will need a calculator. At a minimum, it should be able to compute exponentials and logs. nCr and nPr buttons are useful but not essential.

Material Covered: This course will cover portions of chapters 1–9.

Grading Scheme

You will be graded on your written work, which will be judged on the basis of *correctness*, *completeness*, and *legibility*. Your final grade will be determined out of 600 points as follows:

2 Midterm Exams	100 points each	200 points

Homework: Homework will typically be assigned every class and will also be posted on the web. It is intended as a means for you to test your comprehension, but will not be collected or graded. The solutions manual is on reserve in the libraries for you to check your work.

Quizzes: We will have a short quiz at the end of class every Friday, except when an exam is scheduled. Quizzes will usually consist of two problems taken directly from the assigned problem sets. You may use your handwritten notes (including homework) for the quiz. Quiz scores are not directly computed as part of your final grade, but instead are added to the upcoming exam score (to a maximum of 100 on the exam).

Projects: Each project will entail some computation and research. For each, you will submit an essay (two to three pages) interpreting what you've found. Projects must be typed, but you may include handwritten mathematics if necessary. Including a cover page is not necessary. Late projects will be marked down 5 points per class day after the due date. You will be allowed to work in small groups on the projects; if you do, a portion of your project grade may be based upon attendance and participation in your groups.

Exams: There will be two midterm exams (Sept. 28 and Nov. 2) and a final exam (Wed., Dec. 19, 4:30pm–7:00pm). All midterm exams will be during the regular class hours in the regular location. You may use your calculator, book, and notes on the exams. If you miss a midterm because of a religious observation or other valid reason, inform me well in advance of the exam date and we will arrange an alternate time, or use the average of your other midterm exams in the computation of your grade. The final exam will be cumulative.
